It's one of those things that we all have fond childhood memories of, and therefore knitting is more than a way to pass the time until the baby arrives - it's a way to show the baby how much you care. On the following pages we will show you several different patterns for children's blankets. Through your choice of colors and yarn, you can personalize your blanket to fit your baby perfectly and keep it warm and cozy at any time of the year. Free Houndstooth Blanket Knitting Pattern This classic pattern has been updated with a fairly pleated edge. Free Sunny Baby Blanket Knitting Pattern Let your baby shine with this bright blanket. Free Honeycomb Strollers Blanket Knitting Pattern Excellent texture and variety of colors in a small blanket that fits strollers and cots alike. The first pattern we will look at is a classic houndstooth pattern - here in an optimistic red-and-white color combination. When crocheting a project and you need to change colors in the middle of the row, this is an easy way to seamlessly change the yarn by completing the last seam with a new color. If you are still confused, read on. For Single Crochet: When you're ready to change colors, first unravel your last seam. To unravel it, because you only need half of it. If you are doing one crochet (insert the hook, yarn and draw a loop through.) Now you have two loops on the hook. Add the following color by dragging a loop of a different color through both loops on the hook. Now you can normally crochet from there, and tie two additional wires in the back in a knot. Congratulations, you've successfully switched colors. (It took me a while to figure it out for myself). For Half Double Crochet: Same as for a single crochet, except pull out three loops instead of two. For Double Crochet: Same as for single-sided crocheting, except pull through three loops instead of two, then yarn, pull the yarn through two loops on the hook, pull the loop of the second color through the last two loops on the hook. From now on, continue to crochet normally with a new color. In this way, you can change colors without being able to know by looking at the finished project. Planet Carina This crochet designer buried herself in her sycophant and pulled out all the bulky yarn she had. She then used an N-sized crochet hook to douse it in her grandmother's square blanket. Although she shares the yarn she used, you can use any yarn you have in your symuch. Grandma's squares are excellent blankets made of waste yarn; just use one color until it runs out, and then switch to the next color. One option is to arrange them for the smallest amount up to the maximum amount because the inner squares will be the smallest. Alternatively, arrange them instead of a combination of colors. It worked in sharp, contrasting colors, this blanket is sophisticated, as well as comfortable and warm. Its simple slip-stitch pattern uses only one color yarn in a row so you don't have to wear two colors. Size approximately 42x40 (105.5x101.5 cm), including yarn on the edge of the steering wheel. Soft sports yarn with weight: 913 yards (839.5m) each in 2 colours We used: Lion Brand Babysoft (60% acrylic, 40% nylon, 459 yards [420m] per 5oz ball); #100 White (colour A), 2 skeins; #184 Melon (color B), 2 skein needles: U.S. size 7 (4.5 mm) Term: Needle tapestry Notes: Wear unused yarn loosely along the edge; do not cut the yarn at the end of each color. When sliding the seams, slip as if purl. Gauge 22 seams and 31 row = 40 (10cm) in a pattern Making a blanket with color B, thrown at 216 seams very loosely. Row 1 (right side): Drop color B. Join color A and knit 1. *s yarn in the back slip 1 as if purl, knit 2; Repeat from * to the last 2 seams, with yarn in the back slip 1 as if purl, knit 1. Row 2: With Color A, purl. Row 3: Drop color A, pick up color B, *s yarn in the back slip 1 as if purl, knit 2; repeat from * across the line. Row 4: With color B, purl. Repeat rows 1-4 until the piece measures about 36 1/2 (92.5 cm) finishing in order 4. Make border side edge Using color B, with the right side facing the pick-up and knit 270 seams spaced over 1 side edge. Row 1: (Knit 3, purl 2) over the row. Row 2: (Knit 1, knit front and back stitch, purl 3) across the line. (324 seams) Row 3: (Knit 3, purl 2, purl in front and back of the next seam) over the row. (378 stitches) Row 4: (Knit 3, knit front and back of the next seam, purl 3) over the row. (432 seams) Row 5: (Knit 3, purl 4, make 1 purlwise, purl 1) over the row. (486 stitches) Row 6: (Knit 6, purl 3) over the row. Row 7: (Knit 3, purl 6) over the row. They bind loosely in a pattern. Repeat for the second side edge. Bottom edge Using color B, with the right side facing the pick-up and knit 215 seams evenly spaced over the cast edge. Work lines 1-7 the same as for the side edge. (Keep on the keep at the end: The enlarged rows will have fewer seams than the side edge. You will increase 43 stitches in each order of increase.) They tie all the seams loosely in the pattern. Repeat for the top edge over the edge. Weaving in all yarn ends up on the wrong side of the job. Maybe the chased isn't the kiddie style you're looking for? Go to the next page to get a sample for a very bright and sunny baby blanket. Of course, this blanket can be knitted in any color you want, but bright yellow brings an additional spark of joy and light. A fairly textured pattern makes it even more vivid. The more you wash this yarn, the softer it is. Size 30 1/2x34 (77.5x86.5cm) Yarn: Machine washers worst yarn weight, about 800 meters (731.5m) We used: Plymouth Encore (75% acrylic, 25% wool, 200m [183m] by 31/2oz [100g] skein); #215, 4 skeins Needles: US size 8 (5mm) circular, 29 (73.5cm) long Idea: Tapestry needle weave in the ends of Gauge 17 seams and 32 rows = 4 (10cm) in garter stitch (knit each row) Making a blanket cast at 132 stitches. Rows 1-16: Knit. Start pattern: Row 1 (right side): Knit. Row 2 (wrong side): Knit 8, (purl 8, knit 4) 9 times, purl 8, knit 8. Rows 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11: Repeat Row 1. Rows 4, 6, 8, 10, and 12: Repeat row 2. Rows 13-18: Knit. Repeat the pattern (rows 1-18) 11 times more. Repeat rows 1-12 once again. Knit 16 rows for the border. They tie and weave loose ends to the wrong side of the business. Wash and block. If you want a blanket with even more texture and more colors, try our sash cart cover pattern on the next page. Esther Sandrof, Ravelry Every striped crochet pattern is perfect for scrap metal because you can change color in any row. As long as you have enough of any yarn to take it over one line, then you're in business. Of course, even if you have to combine yarn to complete the order, this too can work. There is a lot of advice on all this in this crochet pattern. This is a rectangular crocheted scarf pattern (or a large blanket scarf). You can customize the pattern to make a larger blanket. This design primarily uses basic crocheted seams, but there are some build-ups for texture. There's a lot of ribs at both ends of this wrapper. You can use short pieces of waste yarn for this edge.
